HOMELESS EDUCATION SERVICES

2021-2022 SCHOOL YEAR IMPACT

Through their Homeless Education Services Program (HES), the San Diego County Office of Education's (SDCOE) Student Services and Programs Division provides support and resources to the 42 school districts in the county, Juvenile Court and Community Schools (JCCS), and county-wide charter schools to implement the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. Each district or school designates a local liaison who serves as the primary contact to interface with the SDCOE HES. SDCOE HES provides technical assistance (TA) and training to the homeless liaisons and other staff who are involved in working with homeless children and youth. The impacts of SDCOE's work to support homeless education services in schools across San Diego County during the 2021-22 school year are shared below:

315 Technical assistance (TA) contacts provided

Local Education Agency (LEA) staff recieved the highest number of TA consultations from SDCOE HES (84%). Other recipients included agency staff, families, students, and early education representatives. The three topics most frequently asked about during TA contacts were:



SDCOE HES supports Project HOPE in collaboration with Foster Youth and Homeless Education Services and the San Diego Unified School District. Feedback from Homeless Liasons and Community-Based Experts

In Spring 2022, SDCOE HES conducted a needs assessment to learn about challenges and successes that schools and communitybased organizations face when supporting students experiencing homelessness. The needs assessment included surveying local homeless liaisons (n = 47) and interviewing a selection of community-based experts (n = 9). Overall, participants from the needs assessment shared positive reviews of working with SDCOE HES:
